



On Friday the 13th of August, Hurricane Charley slammed into Charlotte Harbor with 145 mph winds and continued across the state of Florida, exiting through Daytona. The scope of the devastation affected millions of people, from loss of electricity to the total destruction of homes and even loss of employment. Also affected were the animals: pets, livestock and wildlife.

Responders from across the country arrived in Charlotte County within hours to provide assistance to the victims of Charley. I was lucky enough to be one of those responders, providing assistance and comfort to both the people and the animals whose lives had been affected by this natural disaster.

Members of the American Humane Association, the Humane Society of the United States, Florida's Disaster Animal Response Teams, the Humane Society of Sumter County and numerous other organizations arrived in Punta Gorda, ready to lend a hand. One of the initial tasks was to organize the incoming donations of animal food and supplies, and coordinate the distribution of those supplies to those in need. We used donated trailers to store the huge amounts of feed for dogs, cats, horses, cattle, birds, rabbits and every other imaginable species. Some responders loaded their vehicles with supplies and ventured out into the community, going house to house with donations, while others remained at our staging area to assist the hundreds of people who came to us looking for food, litter and other supplies for their animals.

We also had approximately 500 animals come through our facility. Some were strays lost during the storm. Many others were brought to us by their owners who had lost their homes and were seeking temporary shelter for their animals until they could hopefully get back on their feet. Displaced wildlife brought to our center for care included baby squirrels and raccoons. All animals were examined by a rotating staff of volunteer veterinarians and then transferred to Suncoast Humane Society in Englewood.

Several responders also rode with Charlotte County Animal Control, rescuing strays and performing home checks on animals that had been left behind by evacuated individuals.

The citizens that we met were so grateful for the assistance provided to them and their animals, many of them trying to pay for the food they picked up or simply hugging us with tears in their eyes. I heard many times

from these people that material things can be replaced but they were thankful that their families, including their animals, were alive and well.
